What You Will Learn

This qualification is very in-depth. It requires you to complete 46 questions to meet all four units to achieve the qualification. You will be assigned a tutor who will be available to offer guidance and support through your learning journey.

Assessment

Unit 1 requires you to upload evidence to show that you have used core counselling skills to develop a helping relationship. For example, an occasion when you have supported a client, colleague etc.

Your first unit is expected to be submitted within the first 7 days

You need to aim to complete 8 questions per week to enable you to achieve within the timeframe.

If you wish to achieve this qualification earlier, you can submit all units ahead of the completion date.

Where you are asked to explain, describe or identify you need to submit detailed responses, not one-line answers, as these will not be accepted.

Progression

Progress to higher-level counselling courses, such as Level 3 or Level 4 Diplomas in Counselling.

Pursue a Bachelor's degree in psychology, counseling, or a related field.

Career Options

Completing a Level 2 Certificate in Counselling Skills can be a valuable foundation for a career in counselling or related fields. While it's important to note that the Level 2 Certificate may not qualify you for independent practice as a counsellor, it does provide a basis for further education and specialization. Here are some potential career options and pathways you could consider:

Further Education:

Progress to higher-level counselling courses, such as Level 3 or Level 4 Diplomas in Counselling.

Pursue a Bachelor's degree in psychology, counselling, or a related field.

Support Roles:

Seek employment in roles that involve providing support and assistance, such as support worker, mental health support worker, or care assistant.

Helpline or Hotline Worker:

Gain practical experience by volunteering with organisations that focus on mental health, crisis intervention, or community support.

Life Coaching:

Consider pursuing additional training in life coaching to complement your counselling skills and work with clients on personal development goals.

Specialise:

Identify specific areas of interest within counselling, such as addiction counselling, grief counselling, or trauma counselling, and pursue additional training in those areas.

Additionally, staying informed about industry trends and networking with professionals in the field can open up more opportunities for career advancement.
